# WHEN MANY POINT RAN ON ICE

In a letter dated January 2,1947, Wint Hartman, the Director of Camping for the Minneapolis Area Council later renamed the Viking Council, directed the Camp Ranger, Boots Hanson to "Enlarge the ice house and arrange to have 800 (14"x18"x24") blocks of ice harvested for the 1947 camp season."

Thus began an annual harvest of lake ice that would last until the late 1960s. It was only with the arrival of electric service in all the camping areas that this annual activity finally came to an end. In the early days the camp established and stocked ice houses in the main area, at the Gaylord Lodge, and

# 2018 Summer Camp Recap

The 2018 summer was a remarkable summer. There are a lot of benchmarks and numbers that we can look towards as we measure success. But, at risk of sounding cliché and like a broken record, the 2018 Many Point staff believed in our mission. At each banquet, our entire staff proudly recite together our purpose of developing character, citizenship, fitness and family through fun. There are countless examples of our staff encouraging, teaching, challenging, supporting, mentoring, modeling, and growing the 6000 people that came this year. Scouting methods and Goals of our Outdoor Program are alive and well.

We also knew we were successful in 2018 through unit reservations. As we gathered for our closing banquet, we had 220 units signed up for camp in 2019, a whopping 7 more than the summer before. To the staff of 2018, that meant we



impressed our guests and provided what Scouts are looking for, so well our guests didn't want to go anywhere else. Another number to note – 14 more out of council units attended Many Point than in 2017 – which says to us that our traveling Troops are telling their neighboring units good things about Many Point. Our staff continue to be impressive young adults!

But so much more happened in 2018 that made Many Point special. MPSAA Board member and CIT Director Sean Wachsmuth was our "Alumni Social Media Specialist" who made the effort to share Many Point's daily happenings with our Alumni. On top of that, Sean also spearheaded an effort to improve the CIT

Base Camp, led the building weekends, and created a home for the CIT's that represented the excellence that is ingrained in our culture. If you see Sean at for Many Point a reputation throughout the Fling this year – give him a pat on the back for everything he's done to make MP better.

Another special moment this year was when our Camp Leadership Team worked together to develop our "Guiding Principles." Matt "Rock" Menke, Mike McCollor, and Joel Young were surprise guests and Matt shared words on behalf of Dave's first camp career, Neil Dolan (Campwide PD) shared some personal appreciations as well as sharing some notes from Dr. Tashjian and our other Camp Doctors.

Kevin Mies, 25 years, was recognized with a Legacy Loon. Twenty-five is also known as the "Legacy Year," in recognition of one's legacy created over 25 years at Many Point. To recognize Kevin's 25 summers and wide variety of camp jobs, a list of all the jobs that Kevin has done at Many Point was read out loud, and staff who were in that job this summer stood up. To no surprise, almost the entire room was standing. Kevin was recognized with a hand carved loon with a plaque recognizing his tenure.

Arlene "Granny" Arvola, 30 years, was recognized in many ways. It's tough to put to words how much Granny has meant to Many Point over 30 years. The

# MANY POINT ICE CONTINUED

Family Camp. In 1947 Wint directed Boots to store 600 ice blocks (125 pounds each) at the Main Area Ice House and 400 blocks at Family Camp.

As lake ice harvesting came to Many Point in 1947, most homes in the United States had converted to electric refrigerators. As a child I remember an ice truck still delivered ice to my neighborhood. Ice customers would place a card in their window to request how many pounds of ice were needed. Ice as a refrigerant, traces its beginnings to ancient times, but by the late 1800s the ice industry in the United States was in the top 10 of American Industries. Some historians claim that the total ice industry of harvesting, building ice boxes, storage, transportation and delivery em-

ployed one in five workers. In a personal aside, my great grandfather built "ice boxes" in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

The city of Detroit Lakes played a major part in the ice industry. Because of its location as mid-point

between the West Coast and Eastern markets trains of the Northern Pacific railroad would ice their box cars at this point. As late as the 1960s there was a huge ice storage building on the shore of America, 317 Grand River Ave., Port Big Detroit Lake. Once the largest producer of ice for the Northern Pacific Railroad, the Fargo-Detroit Ice Harvesting Company stood where the Holiday Inn stands today.

Harvesting lake ice at Many Point was a difficult and labor-intensive job. It had to be done when the ice was over a foot thick. The air temperature had to be just below freezing: If it was too cold Let the blocks would refreeze; if too warm it

was difficult to handle the blocks. After the large blocks were cut, they were removed from the water with an inclined ramp and placed in trucks and hauled to a storage shed. In the shed the blocks were covered with clean sawdust. The sawdust was an insulator- and would keep the ice from melting. Ice would keep all summer. Each day enough ice would be uncovered for that day.

With the arrival of electric power to all camps in the late 1960s the "ice era" came to a close. Ice boxes were removed from campsites and the daily truck ice run came to an end. Electric power allowed for camp trading posts and commissary services. The Many Point History Center has a display on Ice Harvesting.



### Stories from the Many Point History Center

As the updating of the back wall of the History Center has progressed the committee has tried to present a comprehensive history of Many Point. As we studied the founders of the camp one name was consistently absent. That man was W. Glen Wallace. Glen was the original architect who designed many of the original camp buildings.

For me, Glen brought back personal memories. Glen was my first Scoutmaster in Troop 107. The troop was sponsored by the Prospect Park Methodist church in Southeast Minneapolis. Glen took us to Many Point in 1951 and 1953. We camped in Ten Chiefs-Sequoyah campsite where the camp ended. I remember Glen as a strong leader who made Scouting fun and exciting. He was also instrumental in encouraging me to achieve the Eagle rank.

The biography below along with his picture will join the "Wall of Founders" in the History Center.

W. Glen Wallace was Many Point's first architect. His plans for the first buildings at Many Point gave the camp a rustic atmosphere. During a time of post-war building materials and labor shortages, he used both native and manufactured materials in creative ways in his building plans.

A personal friend of Many Point's first camp director Wint

Hartman, Glen was a registered architect with an impressive scouting background. Eagle Scout, Scoutmaster, Skipper of the Sea Scout Ship Pegasus, and recipient of the Silver Beaver award for distinguished service to scouting.

During a 20 year period beginning in 1935, Glen served on the Minneapolis City Council. Afterwards, he was a City Planning Engineer and served 15 years as Executive Secretary of the

Minneapolis Capital Long Range Improvements Committee. Wallace also worked part-time as an architect. He was considered one of the grandfathers of the master planners for youth camps and worked on youth camp plans in 48 states. In Minnesota, his projects included Many Point Scout Camp, the Minneapolis Boys and Girls Clubs Camp in Mound and Indian
