

STORIES FROM THE MANY POINT HISTORY CENTER: CAMPING IN THE 1940s & 1950s

A s you make the turn from the History Center's back wall (which contains the History of Scouting and of Many Point), you first see a small campsite display from the 1940s and 1950s. This campsite mock-up shows how early Scouts camped at Many Point. These Scouts were not the "Baby Boomers" who would start coming in the late 1950s. These Scouts were born before and during World War II. Many of these Scouts had fathers and other

family members who had served in World War II. This generation had never known the hardships of the Great Depression or of wartime scarcity. Troops arrived at Many Point to find a wilderness. Campsites were underdeveloped and primitive. While many Scouts camped in their Scout uniforms, some dressed in other outdoor attire. Poison ivy, brush, and mosquitos made wearing shorts impractical.

Scoutmasters were deeply influenced



by their experiences in the military, and their military experiences would influence camping and troop organization and equipment for many years. Troops came to Many Point with a wide collection of equipment and gear, and it was not unusual to see World War II cooking gear and sleeping bags. Tents were made of canvas, lacked mosquito protection and, when

wet, were very heavy.


Buckskin Area troops ate breakfast and supper in the Dining Hall and prepared their own lunch. Ten Chiefs Area troops received a hot supper meal made in the Dining Hall and delivered by truck to their campsite, but prepared their own breakfast and lunch. Troops purchased food for the meals they prepared from the Trading Post grocery store in the Main Area. A block of ice from the Main Area ice house was delivered almost daily to each campsite for refrigeration of their food.

The program at Many Point focused on basic Scouting skills: swimming, camping, cooking, and pioneering. Since most troops came to camp for two weeks, they had time to take canoe trips or long hikes. Some Buckskin Area troops took canoe trips up the logging canal to Elbow Lake, while some Ten Chiefs Area troops took trips south down the Ottertail River to Round or Ice Cracking Lakes. Canoe trips were either day or overnight trips.

Personal note: My Troop 101 camped in Ten Chiefs Area in 1950 and 1953 in Sequoyah, the last campsite in Ten Chiefs. As a city kid, I felt that Many Point was in a vast wilderness. Camping in the 1950s, compared with today, was a real challenge.

2020 SUMMER IN REVIEW

any Point Scout Camp - that's the place to be! And it was during the 2020 summer. We felt a need to be available for kids this year, and we were. Opening a camp this summer took an amazing amount of energy and commitment from our staff. The pandemic threw us new challenges... heightened communication efforts with guests and staff, engagement with government entities, working with the American Camping Association, building new protocols, and building a completely new program model. Planning to be open brought voices of support and voices that questioned us. All of this before one Scout drove past the gate lodge...

Being open, was equally challenging. Social distancing made camp feel different. Staff were in pods of 4 all summer, for both work and recreation time. Staff were asked to stay on camp as much as possible. We brought many of our programs to the Scouts in their campsites. We redesigned our schedule, food system, and programs to be possible with masks and social distancing. Everyone logged their health each day. But, like we have for 75 years now, we persevered and kept the Many Point can do attitude. We served 1289



Scouts and the mission was alive and well in our programs. While this is 1/3 of the population we normally serve, kids needed camp 10 times as much this summer. We are very proud of our staff and their dedication and willingness to follow protocols.

set out at 8:45 a.m. Tuesday in two 18-foot aluminum canoes, borrowed from troop 96 in Minneapolis.

The foursome arrived in Bemidji 1:30 a.m. Thursday after two days of "hard paddling," according to a phone conversation they held with Larry's father, Lawrence Berglund. They had come approximately 140 miles through the river's northward loop.

The youths are doing their to dodge floating logs and compete with rain, wind and mosquitoes.

"We were talking to one of the rangers and found out that we will be the second bunch to get all the way to Bemidji this summer," the mick said. They plotted their postcard to Fred McCormick, assistant camp director.

They figure the trip will take 8 to 10 days of steady paddling and hope to arrive in Minneapolis before Sept. 16. Berglund is due back for classes that day at St. Olaf college, Northfield, where he will be a sophomore. Clay-ton and Buehler are University of Minnesota students.

McCormick said he expected a welcoming committee to be on hand when the paddlers arrive in Anoka or Minneapolis. Mrs. Buehler has promised to have a steak

4 Young, Wet Canoeists Spend 'Night in Jail'

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ST. CLOUD, Minn.—(Special)—Four cold, wet youths spent Thursday night at the city jail—voluntarily, that is. They are the Many Point Boy Scout camp counselors who left Lake Itasca Sept. 3 on a 500-mile canoe trip down the Mississippi river to Minneapolis.

Larry Berglund, 18, 5513 Park place S.; Lee Buehler, 19, Anoka; Bonn Clayton, 19, Glencoe, and Norm Nelson, 19, Kimball, got rain-soaked on the river yesterday and requested shelter indoors.

They had been sleeping outside under tarpaulins since leaving Itasca.

The boys left St. Cloud about 6 a.m. today to continue their paddling to Anoka, where they expect to arrive by 5 p.m. They had the come 440 miles from the river's source. A bout 60 remain between St. Cloud and their destination.
