ary worked at Many Point as a CIT in 1969, started in Ten as program counselor in 1970 and continued working at Many Point until 1975 as a Pioneer program director. While attending Augsburg College focusing on a business degree Gary worked part time at the County Seat, a clothing store and earned the role as manager of a store for five years as he put his college efforts on hold. He returned to college, earned his degree and started teaching business for 17 years at Hennepin Technical College.

Gary brought real life experience to teaching business. As manager he had to work with people – customers, staff, and his regional managers. He understood business

and could share that wisdom with his students. During his time at County Seat and as a teacher of business technology was entering business world - and far more than simple spreadsheets. QuickBooks was entering the business world and Gary states it was akin to the "wild Everyone was buying the west"! program and anxious to learn how to get the most out of it! Gary started training people on QuickBooks. He joined the QuickBooks rodeo and hung on for the ride!

He gave traveling seminars. His area included the US and Canada. Teaching in Canada he would start in Vancouver and continued east "until they spoke French." The United Kingdom used the same QuickBooks as Canada. They needed to know

In time QuickBooks decided the "wild west" west needed taming and wanted to license which company could give the seminars — Gary's was not selected — but he approached the company that was chosen, and that company "hired" Gary and gave him a chance to buy into the company! Gary is still part owner of the company that hired him.

For twenty years Gary traveled the United States giving two-day seminars. He would leave home on Sunday night and return home on Thursday nights – if the flights worked! He would get one week off a month - if it all worked out! He loved the interaction with the people at the seminars. knew Gary from camp you remember how he was quick witted and his ever-engaging charm. He had a way of putting people at ease and generating laughter. Gary was always the "king of quick comments"! The interaction gave Gary energy and motivation. He has been to every major city in America and most of Canada. That all changed with

COVID.

Seminars became online events and the jokes that worked in person were not the same online. There was simply not the connection that he enjoyed with in person seminars. In his words "there was zero interaction." Missing the energy derived from a live audience - Gary decided to retire.


Prior to retirement Gary had two incredible trips with his best friend On the first trip Tom Holden. (1980) he and Tom traveled to Alaska and spent two weeks camping out - in tents, fishing and exploring. They were brought in by a float plane, so they were in the middle of nowhere - except for grizzly's ("ever skin griz pilgrim!?") and BIG brown bear. The bears were hunting for salmon just as Gary and Tom were. Bears were walking through their campsite and fishing in the same river(s) that Gary and Tom were fishing! It was wild! So wild they returned for THREE weeks in 1983 and went on a canoe trip above the Arctic Circle!! They saw no people for three weeks and again lived in a tent. This was Scouting to the max!

Gary notes that time at Many Point gave him tremendous selfconfidence. He learned how to interact with all types and all ages of people. It taught him about living outside – and loving it. From Many Point he made lifelong friends that even when apart for long periods – when together it is like they never left each other. After being at a Pioneer reunion Gary noted," After almost 50 years of not seeing each other, you may immediately recognize someone but after being together for a short time "it is like you were never apart"!

Gary has three children (Jeff, Jack and Maggie) and he gets emotional every time he talks about his six grandchildren! Five grandsons and one granddaughter. All live in Minnesota and if he cannot be with his children or grandchildren for a period, he loves Facetime! Missing the crowd interaction, Gary became a part time BINGO caller at a local casino and loves the interaction that provides.

Gary is pleased with his life and what he has done. He has no regrets!

Our theme, "More in 2024," set the tone for an action-packed season. Many Point became a hive of activity and innovation. We introduced an additional merit badge session, giving scouts more opportunities for advancement. Family Camp also welcomed a brand -new playground, a generous gift from past campers honoring their son. The newly transformed Many Point Training Center hosted 24 Counselors-in-Training (C.I.T.s) and 119 adult leaders, who participated in the Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills Training. And with the return of All Things Aquatics, six scouts took part in this specialized program. Thanks to support from the MPSAA, we also added two sleek new sailboats to our fleet.

reflect The numbers our community's strength and commitment: Many Point hosted 2,757 scouts, 959 adult leaders, 679

Family Campers, 105 staff, 24 C.I.T.s, and over 50 alumni who returned to lend a hand.

But the story doesn't end here. We're already excited for 2025! Next summer, Many Point will expand its STEM offerings with a Robotics Outpost program, allowing scouts to dive into robotics and other STEM fields. New merit badges will include Sustainability, Pulp and Paper, Textiles, Maintenance Automotive providing even more ways to explore and grow.

Heritage Fund Update— Opportunities for End of Year Giving

he Many Point Heritage Fund continues to grow and is now generating almost \$15,000 interest income back to the principal. So far, in 2024 we've had 44 donations adding over \$9,000 bringing our current endowment cash balance to just under \$219,000. Since inception there have been 111 donation events, and we now have "sustaining" donors giving scheduled Estimated estate monthly gifts. commitments continue at the \$2 million level. We are well on our way to our initial \$10 million dollar goal!

I Thomas is an Eagle Scout and the recipient of the prestigious Hornaday Award. It is by no accident that he started his Many Point career in the Conservation Center. From there he moved his way through different positions ending as a camp director at Buckskin – for two years. As the Buckskin director, Al was the first camp director to hire a woman (Jo Benson) in program. Jo did a great job and other woman followed in other camps. After Many Point Al became a professional Scouter! As a professional Scouter he was assigned to return to Many Point. as the business manager. He served in that role for two years and he earned a degree in accounting while working as a Scouter!

In 1985, Al left Scouting and went to work for Merrill-Lynch helping people to reach their financial goals. In time he moved to Dean Whittaker to further his career in helping others with their investments. Now please understand Al loves wildlife and in fact his first degree was in biology! In 2001 Al left the world of finance and became the director of Water Fowl Development. By 2005 Al was the director of Turn in Poachers (TIPS)! In 2009 Al returned to finance as a Business Specialist for Wells Fargo and in 2015 became a Senor Health Care Advisor for optum United Health. There is a

theme emerging here and that is Al likes to help people and causes in which he believes. This is also evident in his volunteer work!

Al was an Eden Prairie volunteer police officer for ten years. He served on the Minnetonka Planning Commission, the Park Board Planning Commission and was on the Minnetonka City Council for twelve years. I cannot imagine what it takes to run for an office in Minnetonka with such a diverse population. It must have ben staggering to try and balance all of the different individual needs! Way to go, Al

When asked about the variety of jobs and volunteer work Al responded that he like the variety. As an observer it appears obvious that AL cares about others. His different roles reflect his interest. His father was a game warden, and Al continues his deep interest in fish, wildlife and the out of doors. Al wants to make a different. He

cares about others. He still does!

In retirement Al bought forest land close to Lake of the Woods where he can fish, hunt, watch nature and just enjoy life! Al's service to others has not ended. Al volunteers to drive people from his area to medical appointments that could be in Fargo, Grand Forks or wherever! He volunteers with the Minnesota DNR Lake of the Woods Fish Advisory Committee and helps by subbing in the Warroad High School and Lake of the Woods School.

Al has a son and daughter, but the best part is – he has three grandchildren! The eleven-year-old grandson was with Al as the grandson harvested a doe with a 173 yard shot during the youth start to hunting, and got three grouse the next day. Plus, the grandson won the meat raffle when they went out to eat!

Al recognizes that Many Point prepared him for life. He learned how to swim and that gave him confidence – especially as he had to qualify for water rescue when


